World-class venue and dreamed location for the first regional multi-sport



The Australia's Gold Coast city is an outstanding

All the boxing action will be hosted at the Oxenford Studios venue. With a capacity of 3,000 seats, the arena will see the Commonwealth's elite boxers jabbing, crossing and hooking their way around the ring to get into the finals.

## 221 boxers coming from 49 countries aiming to compete for the prestigious prize

A total number of 49 nations and 221 athletes will be represented at the twenty-first edition of the Commonwealth Games. On the men's side, the classic ten weight categories will see 167 boxers. But the new comes from the women's side, where for the first time six gold medals in six different weight classes will be at stake for the 54 participating athletes.

At this stage, talk about Frazer Clarke as one of the best boxers in the World is not a big surprise, but the English giant will be making his Commonwealth debut right after recovering from an injury. With Tokyo 2020 clearly targeted, the Gold Coast's stop will be a great touchstone for him.

After reaching the quarterfinals stage at the 2017 World Championships, Kiwi boxing sensation David Nyika will face the Commonwealth title defense in Gold Coast. Young and extremely talented, the New Zealander has a strong potential to stablish himself in between the best heavyweight boxers on the planet.
